DOCTORS FROM COUNTY OF GEORGIA VISIT COLUMBIA FOR VOCATIONAL TRAINING

Four physicians from the country of Georgia came to Columbia in March training to save Georgian babies lives. Their trip was made possible by a Rotary Vocational Training Team (VTT) grant focusing on maternal and child health.

Georgia has the highest stillbirth and neonatal death rate in all of Europe and the Dmanisi region has the highest rate in Georgia. Working with the non-profit organization, A Call To Serve (ACTS), the focus is to reduce these rates by:

1. Training—identify a team of Georgian physicians to become certified trainers and train all physicians and nurses in the delivery area.
2. Prenatal care—improve pregnant women's understanding of the need for prenatal care.
3. Engage the pregnant woman's family and community to support activities for healthy pregnancies.

Phase 1 was launched in June 2015. The vocational training team traveled to Georgia and trained more than 100 physicians. The team consisted of Dr. Trish Blair, team leader and president of ACTS; Dr. John Pardalos, University of Missouri NICU medical director; Erin Khul, R.N., MU NICU and medical transport nurse; and Courtney Kater, St. Joseph Hospital SSM hospital labor and delivery nurse supervisor.

In furtherance of their training, the four Georgian physicians came to the University of Missouri to train with Dr. Pardalos. They are Dr. George Tsilosani, president of ACTS Georgia; Dr. David Kvirkvelidze, medical coordinator of ACTS Georgia; Dr. Khatuna Lomauri, medical director, NICU Tbilisi State Medical School; and Dr. Shorena Chankvetadze, medical director of a 13-bed NICU that will

“The American Academy of Pediatrics intensive training approach is new to Georgians,” Dr. Blair said. “These dedicated physicians have one to two golden minutes to initiate and perform neonatal resuscitation while the simulation training is effective.”

She added, “These physicians are trying to be proficient at tasks they have never seen implemented by a team approach. In addition, the administration of the Georgian neonatal intensive care unit in Georgia is vastly out of date.”

17TH ANNUAL ROCK'N RIBS BARBEQUE FESTIVAL ON APRIL 22 -23 SPONSORED BY THE ROTARY CLUBS OF SPRINGFIELD

What's delicious, mouthwatering and benefits seven Springfield-area children's charities? The 17th annual Rock'n Ribs Barbecue Festival on April 22 and 23, sponsored by the Rotary Clubs of Springfield.

Seventy-seven cook teams from across Missouri and surrounding states will compete at the Ozark Empire Fairgrounds in Springfield for best-barbecue bragging rights, trophies and prize money in this Kansas City BBQ Society- sanctioned event.

While the cook teams toil away Friday and Saturday in their

30-by-40-foot booths, thousands of people of all ages on Saturday get to sample chicken, pork and beef from booth to booth, and enjoy 11 hours of live music by local and regional bands, a Kids Play Zone, motorcycle show, Texas Hold 'Em tournaments, a vendor fair and plenty of food and drink. Advance tickets for Saturday's event are \$8; \$10 at the gate and kids under 12 get in free. Friday night's event is open to adults, sponsors and their cook teams who host private parties on site for invited guests.

Rock'n Ribs has grown into a "must-come event" across the region, said Rotarian Brett Sheets, chair of Rock'n Ribs. Planning for last year's event took 12 months, 1,900-plus volunteers and 200 financial sponsors, Sheets said. "I tell people we build a pretty big city in the course of four days for a two-day event, and then we tear it down in one day."

The biggest winners in the annual event, of course, are the local children's charities that have received \$1,447,250 in proceeds since the first Rock'n Ribs 17 years ago, Sheets said. The 2015 event raised \$182,000 for the charities, the largest amount to date, he said. Recipients include Big Brother Big Sisters of the Ozarks, Harmony House, Ronald McDonald House Charities –Mobile Dental Unit, Great Circle, Ozarks Regional YMCA, Ozark Trails Council-Boy Scouts of America and Good Samaritan Boys Ranch. Run by a small, year-round executive staff and dedicated board of directors, Wonderland Camp, a 501(c)(3) not-for-profit charitable

SHELTERBOX

ShelterBox is an international organization which immediately responds to natural and man-made disasters anywhere around the world. Since 2012, ShelterBox has been a Project Partner with Rotary International. It is worth noting that local Rotarians in or near a disaster-affected area also provide invaluable support to Response Teams.

The name itself reflects the fact that a tent and other supplies are delivered in a large green box. A ShelterBox is a self-contained unit which is given to a family in need of shelter and basic equipment. A large tent, designed for an extended family, is the primary component. More than 13' x 13' in diameter, the two-piece tent has a roofed "porch," a built-in floor (inner unit), and can be set up to withstand 60 mile per hour rotating winds.

ShelterBox has deployed for more than 240 incidents in ninety countries. The list of currently active deployments illustrates the breadth of disaster response since 2001: Cameroon (conflict); Chile (flooding and volcanic activity); Iraq Kurdistan (conflict); Lebanon (conflict); Malawi (Flooding); Nepal (earthquake); Niger (flooding); North Korea (storms); Pakistan (flooding); Philippines (typhoon); Syria (conflict); Vanuatu (cyclone).

Shelter, warmth and dignity summarize the mission of ShelterBox. Thanks to thousands of individuals and groups around the country, ShelterBox has delivered aid to more than 130,000 disaster survivors since 2000.
